CHILD CARE AVAILABLE

Child care is available during the Sunday school, Bible study hour for children too young to attend Sunday school. We offer this to allow parents to attend Bible study or to assist in the SS program. Two volunteers provide care from 9:10-10:25. All volunteers have met Risk Management requirements to work with your children.

St. Luke's loves to have children participate in worship. We also recognize that there may be times when this becomes difficult for parents.. The Family / Child care room is open during worship services every weekend for parents to use with their child(ren) who may be having difficulty sitting in church. There is a changing station in the room as well.

The Family/Child Care room can be accessed through the glass doors toward the front of the sanctuary.



SECURITY UPDATES

St. Luke's, as you know, has been making our building a safer place. Change can be challenging for all but as we work together and understand that safety is a priority for all who may enter our building, we can provide the safety that is needed.

On April 21, persons entering the building during office hours, Monday-Thursday from 8am-4pm and Friday's from 8am -1pm, Lobby Door B began the use of a video doorbell intercom system. When the button is pushed it will ring in the church office and one of the staff will greet you and if the staff person does not recognize the

person, that person will need to identify themselves and the need for entry. The staff will then unlock the door, and the person will be able to open the door by pulling it open or can use the Handicap Button to open the door. The door will be locked again when the door closes.

If you are part of a group that meets after office hours, you may enter through the doors in the Educational Building where the outside doors will be locked but a greeter from that group will meet you at the door to open it for you. A greeter can be the leader of the group or someone that the leader has designated. The doors must remain locked and cannot be propped open in any way, as this will allow for maximum security for those in the building.

Our circles are:

Anna: Operates St. Luke's Bookstore, mission is to support students preparing for full-time church work.

Dorcas: The quilting group, makes quilts for organizations in need. Mission project is Lutheran Bible Translators.

Elizabeth: Operates St. Luke's library, repair hymnals and pew Bible. Mission project is support of Phil's Friend's.

Eunice: Purpose is to care for the Children's Activity Bags, maintain Confirmation gowns, assemble Baptism banners, napkins, maintain hearing aid devices. Mission is to support Sunday School projects.

Eve: the Gardening group, provides a table for produce to be shared with church members, maintain outside landscaping, oversees the garden project, collects eyeglasses, stamps for mission projects. Mission is to share extra produce with church member.

Lois: the decision making body of St. Luke's Preschool. Mission is First Choice Pregnancy Center.

Priscilla: Maintains the church altar area, the mission project is the Confirmation Class.

Rebekah: Purpose is to assemble and prepare the monthly Luke Lines for mailing. Mission is donations to the St. Luke's pantry.

Sarah: the Nursing home group, would play bingo and send cards to members over 90 years of age. This circle is currently inactive.


THE PROCESS OF OUR PASTORAL CALL... SEARCH FOR A NEW CALL CANDIDATE...PART 12 ANOTHER CALL PLACED – NOW CALL DELIBERATION!

The monthly newsletter updates are published to keep the congregation informed of where we are at in the Call Process as we look for a Senior Pastor...

- On March 27th, Reverend Doctor Kent Pierce contacted me to inform me of his decision to return our call. He felt that he had to remain at his present church to complete some work there. We were hopeful that he would accept our call but remain focused that our Father's Will will lead us to the right Shepherd.
- At the voter's meeting in February, we were given the directive to call our second-choice pastoral candidate should Pastor Pierce return the call. On March 28th a call was placed to Reverend Doctor Doug Stowe of Hartford, WI. He and his wife, Sue, drove to St. Luke's on April 5th and spent a good share of the day visiting Staff, Council, and Worship and touring our campus. On Friday, April 11th, I received a call from Pastor Stowe to inform me that he too was returning our call to us. He feels that the Father is leading him to stay at his current congregation.
- Once again following the directives of the February meeting, we will now place a call to the third-choice pastor, Pastor Gregery Hovland, of St. John's Lutheran Church in Portage, WI. He is a Senior Pastor there (since 2015) and his present congregation is almost a mirror image to St. Luke's in membership, confirmands, and average service attendance.
- Due to the very busy Holy Week schedule that every pastor deals with, we have decided to wait until the Tuesday after Easter, April 22⁻⁻⁻, to make the phone call to Pastor Hovland to determine if he is still willing to consider a call from us. If indeed he is willing to prayerfully deliberate a call from us his Call Packet will be mailed out via registered, return receipt mail, either late Tuesday or early Wednesday.
- Please keep Pastor Hovland, St. John's congregation as well as St. Luke's congregation in your prayers over the next few weeks. It is a difficult process for a pastor to consider a call: the impact to his family, his current congregation, St. Luke's congregation, and the task of relocating, all in keeping with the directives he receives from our Heavenly Father.
- The Call Committee has been working on this call process for a year and a half now. We have spent countless hours researching, evaluating, and interviewing pastoral candidates. It is tiring and at times frustrating, but at the same time we have met some awesome pastors. The Lord works in mysterious ways at times. We will find the right Senior Pastor for St. Luke's according to His Will and in His Time. As a committee, we have learned that the call process is a journey and not a destination!

With the corrections made to the Missions report from the Feb. 11, 2025 council meeting, a motion was made by Cindy Weigel and seconded by Nancy Koch to approve and was passed.

Treasurer's Report-Jeff Rieckenberg

End of 2024 (Dec. 2024), January and February treasurer's report was given. It was noted that \$11,846.94 was given to NWD for the end of the year 2024. This amount was actually paid in 2025 due to server issues and could not access shepherd staff before 2024 ended.

Removing the key from the doors in the educational area to prevent doors being left unlocked and those that are using that end of the building would have to monitor the doors and provided a greeter to let people in.


Dedicated Funds-Each ministry is asked to take a look at what they can condense to make fewer accounts.



ST. LUKE'S STUDENT FUND is a way in which our congregation encourages and supports individuals to go into full time church work or attend a Lutheran College. This endeavor is almost as old as St. Luke's is. It has been historically very important to our congregation and the fund has supported dozens of young people and even those a little more mature looking for a new profession.

The actual fund is supported by the St. Luke's Bookstore located in the lower level, fellowship hall. All profits of the store are used to financially support those seeking Christian collegiate education and/or those going to be full-time church workers or pastors. The Student Fund offers grants of \$1,000 a school year for those attending a Lutheran College and \$3,000 a year for those going into full-time church work. As you can imagine, the bookstore alone is not able to fully fund those needs, especially when we have several students applying. We have been very fortunate the last few years in receiving additional funds through money provided by our Compassionate Care fund, however we expect that fund to expend all its funds in 3-4 years. We, most definitely, appreciate our members who have supported the Student Fund with their donations over the years. Our students also share their gratitude! Donations can be given through the offering plate or church office – designated for St. Luke's Student Fund.

This current school year we are supporting three individuals.

- Garrett Anklam, grandson of Chuck and Carol Korn. He is attending Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, MO full time church worker, Master of Divinity. He is currently in his vicarage year.
- Joshua Henry, son of Jim and Debra Henry. He is enrolled in the Specific Ministry Program through Concordia Seminary. The program is 4 years long, the first two years serving as Vicar, being trained by the pastor of the church while taking classes remotely.
- This is a special program allowing him to eventually be the pastor of his home church or another church that uses the same program. He has been installed as vicar and has begun his studies.
- London Kubisiak, daughter of Ned and Kami Kubisiak. London graduated in May 2024 with a degree in Communication Sciences and Disorders from Concordia Mequon. Currently, she is in a 2-year Master program in Speech Language Pathology at Concordia Mequon.

We ask that you pray for Vicar Garrett, Vicar Josh, and London as they continue their education. Applications for grants for the 2025-26 year are being accepted now. Forms and guidelines are available in the church office. Due date for applications is July 1, 2025. The committee reviews applications, money available and determines eligibility. Applicants are notified by mid-August.

If you will be attending a Lutheran College this fall or will be going into full time ministry or church work, you may be eligible for financial assistance through the **St. Luke's Student Fund.** <u>Applications are available in the church office.</u> If you have questions, please contact the church office or one of the trustees of the Student Fund. <u>Application deadline is July 1</u>, 2025. Current trustees are Debra Alft, Cindy Weigel and Holly Johnson.

THE BOOK OF REVELATION

So many of the big name speakers lean too far in one direction or another, giving you the wrong idea about God and the book of Revelation. As much as the Jews didn't know what to expect when Jesus came the first time, we must realistically admit that we don't fully know what to expect when Jesus returns. We know a great deal, but we don't know everything. So, why does this matter? It matters because we must be careful not to fall into the same trap that the Jews fell into by looking for the Messiah to come (or, in our case, return) in a way that does not rightly fit the scriptures. Favoring a historicist view of how to read Revelation, we take an Amillennial view of the end times. Simply put, this is not the juicy stuff you hear on TV and read in books, and it isn't sexy either. Rather, it is a Christ-centered view that aligns with the teachings of the ! If this topic interests you, and you want to know what to believe and what to question (or disbelieve), this study is for you!

The group will meet from 6:00 - 7:30 pm, but the study will not begin until April 3rd.

ST. LUKE'S MEMORIAL GARDEN

Spring is in the air and time to continue the development and maintenance of the Memorial Garden. The garden is a work in progress and there's always something to plan for and do. The committee has already identified several key areas that will be addressed this growing season. Additional trees will be planted to finish the tree line along 12th Street, shrubs that were undermined by gophers will be replaced, and a small garden area that was begun last year will be finished. In addition, there are repairs to be done to the flag pole, a new donated flag will be put up, additional mulching will be done, existing beds will be maintained and spruced up, and water lines finished.



The brick work on the entrance pillars and memorial wall needs to be repaired and the bricks ordered by many of you last year will be installed this year. Much of this work will be done by the Veterans of the Cross and we are so appreciative of the work they do to help us. Also, we are taking orders **through May 15**, for memorial bricks. You can find order blanks for these in the office lobby or the narthex. These bricks will be installed this summer.

Some of you have indicated an interest in purchasing trees or shrubs for a loved one. If you would like to do this, please send your donation to the church office and provide information as to who is being memorialized and if you wish this to be applied for a tree or a shrub. We have to be very discerning in what types of plantings are used as the heat and accessible water is still an issue so the committee prefers to choose the type of tree or shrub your gift will go for. Generally, good, established shrubs are \$40-\$60 and trees are \$70 & up.

We truly appreciate the financial support many of you have provided for the development and upkeep of the garden. We can always use help keeping the plants looking nice, weeding and treating the path. Let us know if you have interest in helping!


